Friends Offer New History Booklet to Community




GOT POPCORN?


Friends Hold Strategic Planning Session


National Train Day

The Heart of Cary Association, in partnership with Amtrak and the Town of Cary, hosted National Train Day at the Cary Depot and the Page-Walker Arts & History Center on May 11.

More than 850 people visited the Page-Walker in celebration of its history as a 19th century railroad hotel. The center came alive with family-friendly activities, including a popular model train display in the main gallery and trackless train rides back and forth from the Page-Walker to the depot. Page-Walker Arts & History Center Supervisor Kris Carmichael put together a slide show on the history of North Carolina railroading, which was shown on the third floor. National Train Day is a holiday started by Amtrak in 2008 as a way of sharing information about the advantages of rail travel and the history of trains in the United States. This was

Program for Deaf Students, Dr. Vijaya Bapat, Jean Ladd

n September 10, 2013, I interviewed four teachers who developed the original program for the deaf. This was my second interview with three of them, and a fourth woman joined us, the mother of a deaf child who participated in the program for twenty-five years. This second interview, which lasted two hours, covered the history of the program in much more detail, beginning in the mid-1960s.

The concept grew out of a group of parents looking for better ways to educate their own children. Once educators were involved and classes were developed, the program was introduced at Cary Elementary School in 1967. It was only the second such program in a public school in North Carolina. A similar program was started in Gastonia just two weeks before the one in Cary.


Over the years, the program evolved and expanded into middle school and then high school. These teachers helped to change laws and the way special needs children were included in the public education system throughout the state.

The four hours of recorded memories from these four teachers are incredible and inspiring. Through their extensive efforts, they enriched education throughout North Carolina while giving their students the world through communication.

On September 17, I interviewed **Dr. Vijaya Bapat.** In an attempt to dispel some of the stereotypes about immigrants, she wished to document some of the history of East Indian immigration to the USA, some details about Indian culture and guiding principles and some statistics about contributions that Indian-Americans have made and are making in America. She talked about what it was like for her to come from India to the US in 1964 and to learn how to function here. She also discussed the growing Indian-American population in the Cary/Morrisville area today, and the variety of Indian businesses, stores, and activities that exist in our community.

On September 20, I interviewed Jean Ladd, a native and long-time resident of Cary. Her father was Glen Hobby, who had a grocery store, hardware store and appliance store in Cary in the early and mid-twentieth century. Jean remembered spending a lot of time there as a child. Jean is related to many other long-time Cary residents. She described growing up here and what her life has been like through the years. Both her children and her grandchildren also live in Cary.

The 2013 growing season, with its early cool and rainy days, benefited most plants but unfortunately the weather was not kind to our "Dunham" hellebores. Thankfully we have several sources to replace the handsome herb named after Rachel Dunham, who was the inspiration for the herb gardens in the 1970s.



There is a new "kid" on the block on the back lawn of the Page-Walker that certainly complements the herb garden. "Dapple," a magnificent sculpture by Victoria Reed, now part

of the Town's collection (thank you Town Council!), munches contentedly on the liriope just a stone's throw from the gardens.

The mullein (right) in the industrial garden with Dapple in the background is one of our favorites. Although mullein is primarily a medicinal herb used for respiratory disorders, our gardeners allow it to grow where it's happy, as most of our mullein plants, if we're lucky, come from the mother plant as volunteers.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION NEWS

A major win for historic preservation in Cary occurred with the relocation of the George Upchurch house in June. The Upchurch farm site on Waldo Rood Road is slated for new development, and initial development plans assumed demolition of the late 19th-century farmhouse. Through outstanding collaboration among the Friends, the property owner, the developer, the Town of Cary and Capital Area Preservation, an agreement was established to move the house across the road to a vacant lot, where it will be preserved by with the intent of selling the house to a private owner.

On June 13, the move took place, with local print and television reporters present and a local TV news helicopter overhead. The move, by McCrary House Movers of Lexington, NC, went off without a hitch. The home is now in its permanent position, on new footings in preparation for restoration. More photos and details about the Upchurch House move are in the <u>CaryCitizen</u> story, the video on our Friends <u>YouTube</u> channel and <u>CAP's</u> <u>project summary.</u>

Our historic preservation program series enters its ninth year. In September, we were fortunate to host **John Santa**, author of *Bluegrass Is My Second Language: A Year in the Life of an Accidental Bluegrass Musician*. John examined the rich history and heritage of bluegrass music in the Tar Heel State. This project was made possible by a grant from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide nonprofit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.
