



White Plains Cemetery, located at 100 Tolliver Court in Maynard Oaks, continues to reveal its treasures. During our recent maintenance day, **Kay Hawkins** discovered an iron finial, an ornamental cap for a fence post, nestled in the ground underneath the very healthy periwinkle. **Tom Byrd**, author of *Around and About Cary*, shared with us that the original wrought iron fence that enclosed

the cemetery had been stolen sometime around World War II for scrap metal. It is possible that Kay's discovery is a part of the original fence. We will pursue the

inquiry and if it is a historical artifact, we'll place the finial in the Cary Heritage Museum at the Page-Walker Arts & History Center.

And speaking of finding treasures, White Plains Cemetery was one of the destinations for those registered in the Cary Scavenger Hunt, sponsored by CaryCitizen and held on September 15. John Loyack, who resides next



to the cemetery, reported that many citizens seemed extremely surprised and excited to find such an historic treasure located in the middle of a 20th-century subdivision. The cemetery lived up to CaryCitizen's description of the scavenger hunt as "an adventure in your own backyard."

Recognition of our treasure continues to grow. This November, Nathaniel Jones of White Plains will receive a national award from the Daughters of the American Revolution recognizing his contributions and service during the American Revolution (additional story page 5). It is an honor for Cary to be nationally recognized for one of its early settlers. Thanks to Cindy Foster, President of the local DAR chapter, Kris Carmichael, Supervisor of the Page-Walker Arts & History Center, Lyman Collins, Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Resources, Kevin Steed, with Cary's Facilities Management Department and Cary's Public Works department for their continuing invaluable support in maintaining this link to Cary's early history.

Cemetery maintenance is an ongoing partnership of the Friends, the Town of Cary, Maynard Oaks residents and Cary citizens. In addition to our quarterly maintenance days, we thank neighbors **Kay & Rob Hawkins**, **Elaine & John Loyack** and **Matt Leitzke** for checking the site

On July 25, 2012, Kris Carmichael and I interviewed Bob Strother at his beautiful Strother Floral Gallery in downtown Cary. In years past, Bob owned both the Matthews House and the Page-Walker Hotel. He gave us a wonderful history of both structures during the times he owned them.

Bob is a native of Cary, and went all through school at Cary High School and started in the florist business after high school. He bought the Matthews House in 1962 and converted the ground floor into his floral shop while living upstairs. Ten years later, he bought the Page-Walker Hotel and moved into it as his home. leaving his floral shop at the Matthews House. While he was the owner, Bob made many changes and additions to both structures. He had a vision to convert the Matthews House into a wedding venue and had started renovations toward that goal. In 1982, he sold the Page-Walker to the town and also lost the Matthews House. After moving his floral shop to several locations around town, in 2003 he moved it one final time to its current location on East Chatham Street.

DAR to Honor Native Son

NATHANIEL JONES RECOGNIZED AS AMERICAN REVOLUTION PATRIOT

One year after Remembrance Day, the rededication of the restored White Plains Cemetery, another important event is planned to occur there. On November 17, from 11:00 am – noon, the Yates Mill chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will honor Nathaniel Jones, who is buried here, as a Patriot of the American Revolution because of his government service.

Nathaniel Jones (1749-1815), was a prominent North Carolinian whose life spanned the Revolutionary War and Federalist eras. Jones was a respected leader who served as a Wake County Commissioner, Justice of the Peace, Sheriff, and Clerk of Court, and was a member of the General

Assembly and the Council of State during the 1780s. He was also a delegate at the Constitutional Convention in Hillsborough in 1788.

Members of the Friends are invited to the ceremony (another reason to begin or renew your membership!), which is expected to include the unveiling of a plaque honoring Jones, a color guard from the Sons of the American Revolution, Jones family descendants and local dignitaries.

Summer Interns
Lend A Hand at Page-Walker

The Page-Walker was blessed to have two young ladies who successfully participated in internships this summer (June – August 2012).

Ashley McNamara, a history major from Western Carolina University, worked more than 150 hours on several very beneficial projects:

- Newspaper Archive sorting, cataloguing and helping to coordinate scanning by the NC State Archives (who did not have copies and were happy to add them to their archives)
- Tom Byrd Historic Cary Research Archives placed in new folders, re-housed folders and created finding aids for the entire collection and each folder
- Templeton Medical Instruments aided in cleaning the display, photographing the instruments for identification, and even contacted the Smithsonian to set up a meeting with a curator who agreed to help identify some of the more curious items
- Textile Collection helped photograph and document more than a dozen women's clothing items (circa 1880 – 1930) and placed them into proper acid-free boxes

In addition, Ashley worked with me to expand and enhance the data entries using PastPerfect software for all of the artifacts on display at the Page-Walker, including those exhibited in the Cary Heritage Museum.

Alaria Sacco, an Appalachian State University student, dedicated 37 hours of her time to the following efforts:

- Read local histories to become familiar with topics and artifacts in our collection
- Worked in our archives with Ashley and created finding aids for a research collection, scanned photos and photocopied newspaper accounts, replacing the acidic original newspapers
- Participated in discussions of exhibition techniques and methods of interpretation
- Aided in cleaning, repairing and reorganizing the museum's timeline display
- Worked with me to re-conceptualize the Cary Heritage Museum layout, creating drawings and suggesting display options.

It was indeed my pleasure to work with Ashley and Alaria. I was impressed with their interest and enthusiasm for the museum field.














HISTORIC PRESERVATION SPEAKER SERIES

preserving the past

The Friends' historic preservation speaker series continues to grow in popularity. On May 22, we presented the seventh annual installment of *What Have We Got to Lose?* This popular program included many new structures never presented before, with a special focus on properties identified as priorities in the historic resources survey that is underway by the Town of Cary.

Our eighth season of historic preservation programs kicks off this fall with our annual Halloween-week presentation about local cemeteries. This year's program, to be held **Tuesday October 30 at 7:30 pm** at the Page-Walker, focuses on several small but important family cemeteries in Cary. The series continues in January 2013; a complete description of this season's programs appears on page 14.

We continue to offer input to plans that affect historic properties in and around Cary. The historic preservation committee recently discussed and studied plans that will affect the historic Waldo house and Mayton house and, with the support of the entire board of directors, plan to formally support the proposal when it comes before the Town Council. Similarly, we also expressed our support for the proposed renovation and adaptive reuse of the Jones-Foy (James Jones) house. Friends representatives also visited the historic George Upchurch farmhouse, which is located on a site proposed for development. The Friends are advocating that opportunities to preserve this structure, most likely at another site, be fully investigated and pursued if possible.
