

American Revolutionary War Patriot

Nov. 17, 2012, almost two hundred years after the death of Nathaniel Jones of White Plains, was a crisp fall day with a glorious sun whose rays filtered through the stunning autumn leaves and branches. It was a perfect day for the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) ceremony that recognized Nathaniel Jones (1749-1815) as an American Revolutionary War patriot with the unveiling of a bronze plaque at his burial place, the White Plains Cemetery in the Maynard Oaks subdivision.

Cynthia Foster, who was responsible for completing the application process through the National Society of the Daughters of the





The Friends of the Page-Walker Hotel are pleased to offer their 2013 History Scholarship. Applications are now being accepted for this annual scholarship that recognizes a student that exhibits an aptitude and passion for the study of history that could result in a career as a history teacher, museum educator, historian or historic preservationist.

The Friends' History Scholarship was established in 2012 to advance their mission of enriching the community by serving as guardians for the Page-Walker Arts & History Center, by advocating preservation of Cary historic sites, by archiving history and facilitating history education, and by promoting the cultural arts.

The dedication and deep commitment of this group are driving forces behind Cary's historic preservation efforts. The Friends take great pride in maintaining the beauty and history of Cary and wish to encourage those attributes in area youth through this scholarship.

The \$750 award is given to a high school senior who is a Cary resident, and may be used for any educational-related expenses. In addition, the recipient's name will be displayed on a permanent plaque at the Page-Walker Arts & History Center, joining 2012 scholarship recipient Redmond Self.

To be eligible, students must submit a 600-1,000 word essay on a local history topic, along with an application and letter of recommendation from their High School history instructor. The 2013 History Scholarship essay topic is *The Role of Education in Making Cary What it is Today*.

Completed applications are due by April 15, 2013. The scholarship recipient will be notified by May 30, 2013 and recognized at the Friends' Board of Directors meeting on June 5, 2013.

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

preserving the past

The Friends' historic preservation speaker series continues to grow in popularity. On January 22, our friends John and Sandy Duncan presented *Why is this House Called Dry?* This program reviewed the history of the Dry family – namesakes of Dry Avenue, with the "favorite son" of the family being Marcus Baxter Dry, long-time Principal at Cary High School; and the history of the Dry House on Faculty Avenue, where the Duncans have lived for decades after restoring the house from top to bottom. In researching the program, Sandy learned that she is actually related by marriage to the Dry family and John recalled all the work he and others did to make the house one of downtown Cary's historic gems.


Our historic preservation program series will continue on March 26 with How Do You Care for Your Family Treasures?, a practical presentation by preservation expert Adrienne Berney from the North Carolina Office of Archives & History about how to safeguard cherished photos, a wedding dress, antique furniture and numerous other precious family heirlooms for future generations. On May 28 we present our annual What Have We Got to Lose? program, a survey of historic properties in and around Cary. All programs are at 7:30 pm at the Page-Walker.

We continue to offer input to plans that affect historic properties in and around Cary. We recently issued a statement (see sidebar) about the planned **Mayton Inn** downtown hotel. We are delighted that the

The cemetery dates to 1867, before Cary was incorporated, and was the subject of the Friends "Mysteries and Secrets" program in 2010.





"TRAINING" SESSION

It is quite fitting, given the Page-Walker's origins as a railroad hotel, that on Saturday March 2, 2013, we hosted the NC Train Host Association Annual Meeting.

The purpose of the NC Train Host Association is to:

- serve as goodwill ambassadors for the NC Department Of Transportation within train stations served by statesupported trains and on board state-supported passenger trains;
- promote patronage of North Carolina's Amtrak;
- assist passengers with travel questions and information;
- assist train crews in duties as requested by them; and
- promote rail safety.

With about 90 people in attendance, the Page-Walker was a busy place! The group took in the museum and learned a bit about the history of the building and our community.



PHOENIX IN CARY

Rob Garner, the Page-Walker's program specialist, has been actively developing some new outreach programs for Project PHOENIX (Promoting Healthy Occupancy through Education, Networking, and Information eXchange), an initiative designed by Town Staff to help create and maintain a stable, satisfied tenant base with a reputation for active management and improved personal safety.

Led by Cary Police officers, the program provides enrichment programming for youth and families that help to build community. Rob and Page-Walker instructor, Greg Whitt, have offered drumming and traditional toys and games programs at several area apartment complexes around town, with more planned. Rob reports that the kids really enjoy playing with the old fashioned folk toys and drumming.





Talking with Doc Thorne, John & Maggie Sears

On September 19, 2012, I interviewed Terry "Doc" Thorne, who was then the president of the Heart of Cary Association. Doc has had a full and colorful career as a graphic artist and designer in advertising, as a talk radio host, and owner and manager of several convenience stores. Doc has run for several political positions, including Wilmington mayor and a seat on the Cary Town Council, neither of which he won. But Doc has been very active in local politics and has served on a number of Cary town committees. As president of the Heart of Cary Association, Doc grew membership from a few dozen to hundreds. Through several projects he initiated, HoCA has raised awareness of downtown businesses and interests and has been very active in the downtown revitalization project. Doc is a key mover and shaker for Cary and we are grateful for all of his efforts and energy.

On October 10, 2012 I interviewed John and Maggie Sears. Both were born in present-day Cary and met at the first Green Hope High School in Carpenter. Maggie's father, Sidney Walker Stone Jr., bought land at the corner of today's High House Road and Davis Drive. There was a farmhouse on the land that was originally built in the 1800s. He bought the land and house about 1921 for his new bride. He then farmed the land and owned a tobacco warehouse in Durham. The Council property across the street was owned by Maggie's grandparents. It passed to her first cousin and then her son, Tim Council. The Council family home was moved recently and that land is being developed. But many of Maggie's relatives are buried in the cemetery on that land. Maggie and John had four children. Their son Bill, who is an architect, is developing Maggie's family farmland into Searstone (a combination of Maggie's maiden and married names), a senior community. Maggie and John will move into their new home at Searstone when it is completed soon.


